#### Did You Hear That?

Although most noise-related hearing loss is gradual and painless, it's permanent. Here are four self-defense steps for your ears:

1 Avoid loud noise. Prolonged exposure to any noise above 90 decibels (dB), like that of a lawnmower, can damage your hearing. *Rule of thumb:* if you have to shout to be

heard, move away or wear ear protection.

2 Wear hearing protectors - ear muffs or plugs as protection from noise on the job and at home when using motorized tools, enjoying hobbies like auto racing or attending concerts. *Fact*: In a recent study, two out of three frequent concert goers suffered temporary hearing loss and ringing in the ears.

- 3 Don't play headphones too loud or wear them too long. Even a cheap set can blast your ears at more than 110 dB, equivalent to that of a chain saw.
- **4** Get your hearing tested periodically if you're often exposed to noise.



We had an extremely busy and productive construction season this summer and fall. Major projects included: Millerstown Road which was widened and paved by contract in cooperation with the Ohio Public Works Commission. Ludlow, Parkview, Ward and Hanna roads were widened by the Engineer's workforce and paved by contract, also in cooperation with the Ohio Public Works Commission. We replaced bridges on Dump, Ward and Dialton roads as well as on Woodville Pike. We did major repairs to two bridges on Hanna Road and a bridge on Millerstown Road. We did extensive storm sewer installation and paving in the Village of Millerstown. In addition, we replaced over 30 culverts and also did major grade work in several locations.
